Tuition and Financial Aid

Canada and Saskatchewan Student Loans are available to qualified students. This diploma program focuses on the necessity of Mental Health and Addictions Workers/Counsellors in Saskatoon and surrounding communities. As mental health concerns, substance abuse, and suicide rates continue to climb, more workers will be needed in the mental health and addictions sector.

Currently, there are many job opportunities available to workers in the mental health and addictions area. These jobs include, but are not limited to, support workers, case managers, live-in mentors, youth counsellors, crisis counsellors, youth workers, outreach workers,

emergency response planning, peer support, and housing support workers.

According to The Centre for Addictions and Mental Health, 1 in 5 Canadians experience a mental illness or addictions problem in any given year. In fact, people with mental illness are twice as likely to have addictions issues compared to others. On the other end, those with substance abuse problems are up to 3 times more likely to have a mental illness. Saskatoon has a large vulnerable population, and

statistics indicate that the lowest income group are 3 to 4 times more likely to report poor to fair mental health. The large homeless population is also at severe risk for substance abuse and/or mental health disorders.

Another important statistic relates to our Indigenous population. First Nations youth are 5 to 6 times more likely to die by suicide than non-Aboriginal youth. This number goes up to 11 times with our Inuit population. There needs to be a greater focus on the effects of

intergenerational trauma and how we can help support those that are affected.

The stigma of mental health and addictions continues to negatively affect our ability to create change. Our course looks to bridge the gap between needs for services and qualified individuals who can help make a difference in our communities.

This is a crisis often highlighted in the news.
